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The more glaring thing is that the scope of freelancing has expanded, allowing professionals to establish independent services and earn an income. This shift has motivated graduates to stay engaged and productive in their specializations, finding ways to monetize their skills outside the confines of office jobs. Traditionally limited to library roles, LIS now encompasses a wide array of career options, thanks to the digital revolution and the rapid growth of information technology. Information entrepreneurship, which leverages skills to develop innovative services and products, and freelancing in LIS now enable professionals to work autonomously, offering services to a broad client base. Mohanty (2020) further supports this, noting that freelancing provides growing opportunities for young graduates, helping them to establish financial independence and achieve their potential without relying on family support.

Freelancing, broadly defined as a work arrangement where individuals offer services to clients on a project or contract basis rather than being employed full-time by an organization, provides flexibility and autonomy to professionals in various industries, including LIS (Kitching et al., 2015). Similarly, information entrepreneurship involves creating and managing innovative ventures based on the unique expertise of LIS professionals, such as knowledge management, information organization, or digital archiving (Singh, 2022). These emerging opportunities address challenges such as limited job openings in traditional library settings, enhancing the relevance of LIS professionals in today's digital and knowledge-driven economy. Difficulty Securing Clients: Building a steady client base is another major hurdle, especially for new freelancers competing with established institutions. Networking, marketing, and showcasing unique expertise are essential to securing contracts (Campana, 2023). To promote freelancing, government bodies and industry organizations could organize networking events, offer marketing resources, or create mentorship programs to help freelancers build strong professional networks and portfolios.

Limited Access to Resources: Freelancers, particularly those in specialized fields, may not have access to tools or resources that institutional professionals enjoy, such as subscription databases, extensive collections, or industry software (Campana, 2023). Professional Development: Unlike employees in traditional jobs, freelancers must invest in their own professional development, often without institutional support (Rahman & Rahman, 2017). Internet and Payment Challenges: Freelancers in developing countries often face unreliable internet connectivity and limited payment options, which hinder their ability to work effectively
